The Answer of Mr. Shankes to severall Interrogatories put to  
 him by the upper house.

This Depon<sup>t</sup>: Saith that he with y<sup>e</sup> Maryland Forces being at the  
 Girt of the Susquehannoughs on y<sup>e</sup> Sabbath day he was sent upto the  
 Girt to desie one of the great men by Name Spariguera to come and  
 speake with Major Truman, and y<sup>e</sup> said Spariguera being dead this  
 Deponent desied some other great man to come and speake with y<sup>e</sup> S<sup>r</sup>:  
 Major - Upon which message of his, there came out 3 or 4 of them,  
 and this Deponent was commanded by the S<sup>r</sup>: Major to tell them  
 of y<sup>e</sup> great Injuries that had been done to y<sup>e</sup> County and y<sup>e</sup> he came to  
 know who they were y<sup>e</sup> had done them, and the great men Replied  
 it was the Senecas, and this deponent saith that there being other Indians  
 present from other towns, the Major desied some of them young men  
 to assist as pilotes as well as y<sup>e</sup> Neighbouring Indians had done to joine  
 in y<sup>e</sup> pursuit of the Senecas. And the said Indians Replied that  
 the Senecas had been gone 4 days and y<sup>e</sup> by y<sup>e</sup> time they might be at y<sup>e</sup>  
 head of Patapscoe River, to which Major Truman Returned that he  
 had good horses and they were good footmen and might soon overtake  
 them and the Indians Replied they would, And y<sup>e</sup> Deponent further saith  
 that in y<sup>e</sup> Morning following the Susquehannoughs great men being  
 at the place of meeting before y<sup>e</sup> Maryland and Virginians, y<sup>e</sup> y<sup>e</sup>  
 great men were taxed againe by the Virginians more highly of y<sup>e</sup> Injuries
