 the Bill Entituled an act of Attainder - His Lordsh<sup>ps</sup> and this House doe  
 conceive it not safe for them to vote the Killing of the five or six  
 Susquehannockes Impaled nor Murders, for to them and all  
 the world it does and will certainly appear the greatest that ever  
 hath been committed.

That the unanimous consent of the Virginians (if true) does not  
 wayes alter the nature of the Crime, nor since the said Inman  
 has Instructions plain enough to have made him abhorred and  
 abominated, soe black an Action can as little serve for an extenuation  
 thereof; And whereas in the said Paper for a further extenuation  
 it is signified, that the Major to prevent a mutiny of the whole  
 Army was Compelled and drawn to the Action.

This House are of a nother Opinion, for at the said Inmans Trial  
 did too plainly appear that his first Comands for the Killing of those  
 Indians was not obeyed and that he had some difficulty to get his  
 men to obey him therein, and that after they were put to death not
