

Dorchester County shall goe to the Upper House or not, determined. May
The Committee for the Safety of Lawes goe out

The Members sent to the Upper House return and say they have delivred
their Message, and that the Upper House will send for them when they are
more at Leisure. The upper House sends for the Members afo. who goe up
with the leave of this House.

Then was read an Act providing in Case of Sudden Accidents in the
Government, the third time, and referred to by this House.

Then came Maj^t Truman, Mr^t Seely Darnall, and Col^t Burgess from the
Upper House with the following Message, brif.

Upper House 10th October 1683.

This House being much surprised to see a Message this day sent in
writing from the Lower House, & because a bill for Electing Burgess &c had not
yet past this House, there should seem any intent, in this House to exact
of it a Consylgance to the bill for Townes so much desired (as in y^e same
Message is exprefly mentioned) by His Lord^s and Upper House, and y^t from a
time thare should be a Suspicion this House intended not that fair
Consylgance which y^e present affaires of the Province doe neceſſarily
require. This House for Answer doe say that as the buyness of Townes
was y^e first and principall thing recommended by His Lord^s at the opening
of this Session, doeth this House, doe hope that the Lower House will shew
themselves equally desirous and zealous for the same, and this House being
fully assured that Townes are judged by y^e Lower House to be of that
great advantage and Generall good to this Province, which this House
is very confident they will be found to be, was the reason and moe
other of that Message from this House, wherein it was desired, the bill
for Townes might be first dispatcht, which yett this House have not
received though there is now a full week past since the first Meeting
of this Assembly, and as yett not any request or desire has appeared from
the Lower House of having any Members of this House to joyne in forme
for y^e affaire. & which gave this House some apprehensions that
there had not been soe great a progreſſ made by the Lower House in that
buyness of Townes as since appears there has been.

And now that the Lower House may be assured of all faire proceeding
from this House. The Bill for Electing Burgess has been twice read and
now in full Debate of this House on y^e same, this House doe return
. manner of Electing Delegates and Deputyes

. be alreade settled by His Lord^s of the good people
of this Province is that to joyne in a bill for affertaining
. said ordinance with this alteration in the
. a to haue their power from y^e Electors, and this
