Screeve sent to the Upper house with the bill for Naturalizing Andrew Paulson be reported to, and the Bill for Naturalizing Nicholas Berbraack not reported to, and ordered that the Messengers acquaint the Upper house of the reasons why Berbraack's bill is not reported to is because the said Berbraack is not Inhabitant of this Province as is suggested.

They returne and say they have delivered the same.

Then was read a bill entitled An Act for Reviving the Temporary Lawes the second time.

Capt. Hill sent to the upper house for the booke of Lawes.

He returnes and brings it with him.

Then was read an Act entitled an Act Limiting the Extent of Attachment and providing what shall be levyed on Attachments and Executions, the third time and passed this house.

M<sup>r</sup>. Dunford and M<sup>r</sup>. Hatton, sent to the Upper house with the Bill.

They returne and say they have delivered the same.
