Lover house of Assembly October 29<sup>th</sup> 1683.

Your Lordships Most Humble and Obedient Servants of Upper and the Lower houses of this present Generall Assembly, with all imaginable Gratitude acknowledging Your Lordships great love and affection to the good people of this province expressed in your Lordsp: Speech to your two houses at y. opening of this session, and more especially in conveing this assembly and appointing this provinciale court to be held in this place, doe mee the center of Your Lordships province, to the great ease and generall conveniency of the inhabitants thereof doe with all dutifull affections hereby present to your Lordsp: their most humble and hearty thanks.

And in further demonstration of their gratitude Duty and affection do pray your Lordp: acceptance of the quantity of one hundred thousand pounds of tobacco to be levied upon the taxables of this province, this present year.

And doe further pray your Lordp: that you please to signify to both houses at what place your Lordsh: Intends all future assemblies, Provinciale Courts and offices to be held and kept at, that a committee of both houses may forthwith goe out, to confect the readiest and best way of making provision of Buildings fit for y. reception and accomodation thereof.
