

So sufficient as to that end, that they have no need to doubt his Lord's assent therunto, so that if the upper house will not proceed without the act be left out then this house cannot proceed further therein.

He returnd and says the upper house answered, that though of said act hath pass'd both houses, and his Lord's hath been there since, yet y^e house believe his Lord^t knowes nothing of it, but that the house will debate the matter further, and send answere thereto.

Coll^r Stevens from the upper house desir'd that this house would pass the bill for Ascertaining the Lawes, as it is, and the upper house will prepare something by t^e time his Lord^t comes, as shall satisfy the intent and designe of this house.

Lower house of Assembly November the third 1683.

This house is willing to concure and agree, with y^e upp^r house in passing an act for Ascertaining all Lawes, made or that shall be made in the absence of his Lord^t, and not yet disapented to, if the upper house be willing to assent to the same, but to draw up a law short of that end, and willingly and willingly leave some (many) lawes at an infestancy, as necessarily will be by leaving out the act of Appeals made in anno: 1678.

This house conceives, noe wayer becomes the prudence of both houses, — especially at a time when intention is made to settle and Ascertayne of same.

Coll^r Stevens bring^s a Message from the upper house, w^t being read is as follo^ws:

Upper house Novemb^r 3^d 1683.

Mr. Young having besought this house to accept of Mr. James Phillips of Baltimore County and Mr. John Cox of Cecil County, as security for Jacob Young that he shall within two months transpot himself out of this province into some part of Europe and never againe returne into this province or any other part of America, without Speciall Licence from his Lord^t and y^e consent of Assembly. This house have thought to move the same to y^e Lower house for their approbacion before this house give their refut thereto.

Then was presented to this house A Bill Entitld. An Act for the paymt^t of the Proprietary of 2^d & th^t. &c. And read y^e first time, second and third time by Speciall Order of the house.

The question was then putt whether y^e said bill shoule pass this house
Yea or Nay - Voted in the affirmative.

The said bill being signed was sent to the upper house by Mr. Buford, Mr. Hutton, Mr. Adams, Mr. Rich and some Mr. Penalls and Mr. Geer.

Whereupon their returne say they have delivered the same.
