This house have admitted of the above deposition in excuse of Jacob  
Young to have him and his baile for not appearing this assembly  
and send it down to the Lower house, for their concurrence and  
approbation.

Then was read the petition of Joseph Tilly prisoner and referred  
to a full house for further consideration.

The house Resolved into a Grand Committee and adjourned  
into the Councill: Where were present of the Upper house-

Mr. Richard Hall and Mr. William Richardson members of this  
house were denied entrance into y<sup>e</sup> Upper house by y<sup>e</sup> doorkeeper except  
they would putt off their hats. Whereupon arose some dispute between  
the two houses - The upper house pressing to proceed upon y<sup>e</sup> business of  
y<sup>e</sup> Grand Committee, y<sup>e</sup> Lower house answering they cannot without  
their members, which were kept out. At last the upper house give order  
for y<sup>e</sup> members to be admitted, for this time, because the more weighty  
affaires now before them should not be delayed, but to bee no rule  
for the future.

The said members were lett in, and the Grand Committee  
proceed. Then was read the address to his Lop: and the whole matter  
as then perrned agreed on, and consented to.

Then Mr. Carville Read y<sup>e</sup> Schedule (to be annexed to the address)  
To the Grand Committee of both houses. Which being done-

The Committee adjourne to the house.
