

Certain proposals from His Ex^{ty} the Gov^{ty} & Council layd before
this House and Debated and Resolved upon as follows.

That at Milton Stad: the parish Church be built within the port

Proposed that whether the Shippes now in the Country or others
that shall come in shall be cleared as they are ready to be sent to
go under a Convey in a Fleet, and to advise which will most conduce
to his Ma^{ty} Service.

The House because of the uncertainty of the arrivall of y^e Fleet
think it will be most for his Ma^{ty} Service that such Shippes when fitted
may be cleared.

That at the port of Annapolis a Lot may be layd out for the
Minister nigh to the place where the Church is to stand, and that the
Minister be obliged to read prayers twice a day.

It being represented that there is likely to be a scarcity of Corne in
the Country this year. It is therefore proposed that an Ord^e pass
as for the Exportation of it.

Resolved Nemine Contradicente that His Ex^{ty} would be pleased
to issue his proclamation against the Exportation of Corne.

persons of this Province have been induced to leave the same, some
going with their Wives and Families to the Southward and some to the
Northward, viz^t Carolina and Pennsylvania, being deceived with
the false report of the great plenty these places lie in which severall
have tryed to their wooll experience some returning in a poor
condition and other willing to return if they could but are not able
having sold their Estates here and by their removal spent most or all
of their Substance, whereby they have incapacitated themselves to
make any return. Other terrified out of the Province through a
vain notion of great and heavy taxes of an hogth or more of head
whereas the same evidently appears a frivolous idle Complaint,
not but that they are somewhat large through arrears ever since the
Revolution but now hope in Gods will be satisfied this year, so
that the levys will become as light as ever they used to be.
