delivered safe.

Then His Ex^{ty} ordered the Indians that were evidence at Coxeau's to stay,
but dismissed the rest as they saw fit. He told them that what was now said
was before the whole Province being that from all parts of it were present
and His Ex^{ty} acquaints them that Col. Addison and Major Smallwood of
this Conference to whom the Indians might

after which His Ex^{ty} and the Members of the Hon^{ble} Council being withdrawn
the House adjourned until 6 of ye Clock to Morrow Morning.

Saturday July the 4th 1690.

The House met. Then read over what was done yesterday.
A Bill for the Service of Almighty God and the Establishment of the Protestant
Religion within this Province, read the second tyme and passed. Memos
Contradictorie, The said Bill sent up to the Hon^{ble} Council by Capt. Hill.
Mr. Tammard Mr. Ingham, Major Dousey, Mr. Scarborough & Mr. Hawkins.
Who returns and say they have delivered the said Bill to the Hon^{ble} Council.

The House adjourned for two hours.

Resolved an address be sent to the Lords of His Ma^{ty} (most Hon^{ble} the
Privy Council to thank them for the Care of the Province.

The Emp^{er} of Piscataway and the other Indians being called in
His Ma^{ty} Commission under the broad Seal of this Province was
delivered and given the said Emp^{er}. Constituting him Comander of all
the Indians on the Western Shore of Maryland.

Committee of Lawes enter the House.

His Ex^{ty} proposes and recommends to the House the Consideration of
the Gov^{er} of New Yorks Letter, and if they will send any more Money
to the Assistance of New York - His Ex^{ty} will advance the same.

Recommended from His Ex^{ty} that if the House thinke fit to pass the
Act of Religion as proposed the Province shall be at no Charge at
passing thereof - but His Ex^{ty} will pay the same.

A Bill for Sanctifying and Keeping holy the Lords day commonly called
Sunday - read the first tyme.

A Bill for settling the Clarke of the Councils Office - read the first tyme
and passed.

A Supplementary Bill to the Act for imposing a duty upon Officers -
read the first tyme.

The afo^{re} Bill read the second & third tyme and sent up to His Majesties
Honourable Council.
