

Resolved it is an Aggrievance and that the Country hath never yett received any benefit thereby and -Ordered that the Governor and Visitors of the Free Schools doe the next Session of Assembly lay before the House an exact and true Account of what money hath been raised for the use of the Free Schools and how they have disposed of the same, and by what Authority they take and remove the same that the House may then further consider thereof, and that the said Governor and Visitors then appear her

(And it is further Offered by this Committee as an Aggrievance that the long and tedious way prescribed by the Act for Attachments and the great and extravagant charges therof before an Attachment can be obtained against any person that leavas the Province or otherwise not to be found doth not answer the intent and design of the said Act

Resolved the House concur with the Committee that it is an Aggrievance and that they will the next Session of Assembly consider the mean to redress the same.

(And it is further Offered by this Committee as an Aggrievance that no care is taken for the payment ~~and~~^{of the} charge and expences of such poor Evidence and other poor persons as are obliged to attend the Provinciall Court ready many being the only thing that the Ordinary Keepers will accomodate them for, and that being not to be had occasions them to want such Accomodations as are necessary at their attendance on the said Court.

Resolved the House will the next Session of Assembly consider of the means to redress this Aggrievance

(And it is further offered by this Committee as an Aggrievance that there is no Act of Assembly of this Province that declares which of the Statutes of England are in force here it being now left to the discretion of the Justices of the severall Courts to admitt or deny them whereby it comes to pass that an Act of Parliament allowed of in one Court is denied in the next in which meane her Majestys Subjects know not what Acts of Parliament they hanfge or what are for their redife -

Resolved it is highly necessary that a Bill shoule passe to declare which of the Statutes of England are necessary to reme force here and referred to the consideration of the next Session of Assembly.

(And it is further offered by this Committee as an Aggrievance that the Act for Probate of Wills and granting Administrations &c is too dark and obscure in severall particulars that it answers not
