

Resolved it is an Aggravance and that the Country hath never yett received any benefit thereby and - Orderd that the Governour and Visitors of the Free schools doe the next Session of Assembly lay before this House an exact and true Account of what money hath been raised for the use of the Free schools and how they have disposed of the same, and by what Authority they take and receive the same that this House may then further consider thereof, and that the said Governour and Visitors then appear &c.

And it is further Offered by this Committee as an Aggravance that the long and tedious way prescribed by the Act for Attachments and the great and extravagant charges thereof before an Attachment can be obtained against any person that leaves the Province or otherwise not to be found doth not answer the Intent and design of the said Act.

Resolved the House concur with the Committee that it is an Aggravance and that they will the next Session of Assembly consider the means to redress the same.

And it is further Offered by this Committee as an Aggravance that no care is taken for the payment ^{of the} charges and expences of such Jurors Evidences and other poor persons as are obliged to attend the Provinciaall Court ready money being the only thing that the Ordinary Keepers will accomodate them for, and that being not to be had occasions them to want such Accomodations as are necessary at their Attendance on the said Court.

Resolved the House will the next Session of Assembly consider of the means to redress this Aggravance.

And it is further offered by this Committee as an Aggravance that there is no Act of Assembly of this Province that declares which of the Statutes of England are in force here it being now left to the discretion of the Justices of the severall Courts to admit or deny them whereby it comes to pass that an Act of Parliament allowed of in one Court is denyed in the next by which means her Majesty's Subjects know not what Acts of Parliament they transgress or what are for their welfare -

Resolved it is highly necessary that a Bill should pass to declare which of the Statutes of England are necessary to be in force here and referred to the consideration of the next Session of Assembly.

And it is further offered by this Committee as an Aggravance that the Act for Provall of writs and granting Administrations &c. is soe dark and obscure in severall particulars that it answers not
