Gov<sup>r</sup> Notwithstanding the many Reflections you have in this  
 Opinion so liberally bestowed upon this Board and the ill usage you  
 have so liberally treated us with which is too obvious in several  
 of your Messages and particularly in that you sent us yesterday  
 by M<sup>r</sup> Garrett and seven others and which all the world will allow  
 are no way parliamentary but savour of Great Indiscretion  
 we make no doubt we should in the Support of our own Character &  
 out of a Generous Regard to the Reputation of your House as well  
 as the Interest of the Province (had you agreed to give us a  
 Conference on the Subject Matter of enforcing her Majesty's Commands  
 relating to the fines of Ordinary Licences) have easily  
 convinced you that the Address you propose to her Majesty <sup>and sent the copy you see</sup> has very little  
 or no weight in it and that you have therein through a Mistake  
 asserted that which is utterly untrue and particularly in that part  
 thereof where you fix the Basis of your refusal to comply w<sup>th</sup> her  
 Majesty's Royall Commands We could do no less than Represent <sup>to</sup>  
 to you and lest the consequences of this affair be never so destructive to  
 the Interest of this poor Province it will up at your Door if you  
 refuse the warning given you and we shall shortly be acquitted thereof  
 We know not of anything we have to offer but what we think every  
 material and shall be as carefull as any of your House how  
 we increase the Country's Charge by any delay which you cannot  
 charge us with unless you believe the enforcing her Majesty's
