By his Excellency the Governor's Council in Assembly December 8th 1701.

Since the rising of the last Session of Assembly the following Remarks have been made on some particular Laws.

1 And first as to the Act prohibiting the Importation of Broad Cloth & Grain from Pennsylvania and other Parts of America, whether it be in the Legislative Power of this Province so to do, or any otherwise prohibit Trade; and if it were not better to lay a severe Duty thereon might serve for a Prohibition.

2 Secondly As to the Act obliging Masters of Ships to publish their Freight before they take Goods on Board it is not so well worded and ascertained by saying their certain Freight to answer the Intent of the Masters but only serves to annoy the Merchants at Home.
