

His Excellency observing what white Servants are or have been for some Years past been imported into this her Majority Province into generally Irish Subjects who are induced to come hither by the false & specious Pretence of the free Exercise of their superstitious worship and having Land at the Head of the Bay settled on them at the Expence of their Masters Servitudes, so that many hundreds have been lately imported is pleased to ask the Advice of the General Assembly whether on due Consideration thereof, are not apparent Reasons for Majestys Loyal good Subjects should be apprehensive of that growing Evil and more especially since those sort of People are scattered in great Numbers in Baltimore County and at the Head of the Bay frontiers of this Province most liable to the Invasion of the common Enemy; wherefore in case the Country thinks this deserves their Notice his Excellency doth beseech them to advise what Measures are to be taken for the Prevention thereof for that the Duty of twenty Shillings per Poll is not any Discouragement to that Importation and whether it be not reasonable by some Law to forbid the Sale of Protestant Servants to Masters of the Romish Church they being generally seduced in their Religion or otherwise mislead in their Persons.
