Wherefore he humbly prays your Excellency and this Honble. Assembly to do him Justice and let him have the Land so dearly bought and honestly paid for and he shall ever pray Indorsed By the Governor and Council in Assembly April 9th 1706 We know this Petition to be true think it reasonable and recommend it to the House of Delegates Signed by Order W. Bladen C. Council

Upon reading the foregoing Petition it is the Opinion of the House that Mr Bladen first lay out his Lots and make the Country sensible of what is set forth in his Petition then this House will further consider to make the Astitution Proposals offered in the House to prepare a Bill to ascertain the Price of the following Coin

Ordered That a Bill be prepared to ascertain it pursuant to the Proposal The following Message ordered to be prepared and read in the House Vizt

(By the House of Delegates April 11th 1706) In Answer to your Proposal made to this House by his Excellency and your Honours whether it be not highly necessary to annex the Lot on which the old Vestry House is built to the Parson's House Lot, this House is ready to concur and agree that the same may be annexed as proposed but they are not at present inclinable to make any Improvement thereon. Which being read and approved of was sent up to his Excellency and Council by Mr Samuel Magruden and Mr Thomas Howe

The House adjourns till two O'Clock in the Afternoon

Post Meridiem The House met again according to Adjournment and were all present as in the Morning
