The House met again. Being called over were all present as Yesterday
Read what was done Yesterday. And upon reading the Petition of Job Evans and his wife Adm^{rs} of John Lowry deceased. Inspection was made in the Journal of Accounts Febry 19th 1697^o wherein by Mr. Mason's Letter and his Account it is found that in the Year there was lodged in the Hands of Mr. Robert Mason then Treasurer of the Western Shore the Sum of £50 Sterling payable to the said John Lowry but does not appear to this House that the same or any Part thereof has been since satisfied. Therefore Ordered that Mrs. Susannah Mason Ex^{at} of the said Robert Mason appear before the House next Session of Assembly and that she has Notice to bring her Books Accounts and Papers Receipts if any to show if the Debt aforesaid be satisfied or not or otherwise to pay the same to the said Administrators

Message by James Saunders Esq, of Yesterday read in the House vizt
By his Excellency the Governor and Council in Assembly April 17th 1706

Several Complaints being made to this Board that Persons sent to the Indians at the Head of the Bay have been so slightly rewarded for their extraordinary Services that it will be of ill Consequence and to the Discouragement of others on the like Occasions. We desire the House of Delegates will seriously reflect thereon and particularly how Mr. John Hall and a certain Indian by him employed have been gratified

Signed by Order W. Bladen Secy Council

Read and resolved Mr. John Hall be allowed more 600^l to be paid and the Indian 20^l.
Indorsed and sent up to the Council of Mr. Gerard Howltho.

Andrew Woolgley Carpenter being called into the House to treat and agree with him to bring the Powder House into the Town of Annapolis; he appeared and it was proposed to him whether he would undertake the work and to remove the House place it where his Excellency shall please to appoint and to run all Risque and Hazard and settle the same House in such Place in as good Condition as it now stands for £15 Sterling which he agreed to and obliged himself to have it done by the middle of July next to all which this House likewise agreed.
