

Years ago gave Clark's Boat hold of their Quarter and seemed to be very glad to see them well called Clark by the Name of Garret. Both Boats went into Elizabeth River and well and his Company was taken up at Norfolk Town by Major Bush and Captain Mason and Clark pleaded that Daniel Wells was an honest Man and good Liver. The Boy had like to have betrayed them for he said he was a Woman's Servant here. Wells said he was his Servant and bought him to assist designing to buy a Plantation and was intended to get a Plantation at New River in Carolina. There was a Letter of Mark Sloop there and the Crew was afraid Thomas Brabatch and Wells intended to cut her Loops and run away on privateering. Clark got drunk with the Letter of Markman and fought with two or three of them. The Privateer Brabatch was employed to get a Vessel off that was was drove on Shore by a Tempest Clark directed Wells and Harrison to one Capt Smith in New River till he could come to them, hired this Shallop of Peter Cartwright and left his two Negroes three Trunks and his Cloaths in Pawn until his Return persuaded the Declarant to come up again with him to Wicocomoco to his Uncle Samuel Smith's, and took on Board the Shallop Thomas Wintersole and one James also a young Trooman and came up to Potowmack Point where also went over the Bay with the Declarant's Brother William Broxton. Clark and Wintersole went to carry Mr. Plumer's Boat back again. Clark sent for John Spry and hired him as the Skipper of the Shallop to come up to South River in Maryland with the Declarant at the Rate of three Pounds ten Shillings & Month and the Declarant at Eighteen Pence & Diem and gave Instructions in an open Paper in Writing directed to Mr. Joseph Hill to whom he also gave them a Letter at parting said Good Friends whatever you do apply yourselves to Mr. Hill without any further Enquiries said Clark told them they were to bring down his wife and Children and Wintersole's wife to whom Wintersole sent a Letter and according to Order they came to South River on Saturday 20th March the Declarant went on Shore to John Pain's Plantation who showed him the way to Mr. Hill's where he lay that Night and the next Morning gave said Hill Clark's Letter. Mr. Hill directed two Horses to be got and with the Declarant went on Board the Sloop and discoursed the Skipper Spry and after which the said Hill and Declarant went to Captain Wolsho's where was Richard Clark and Wintersole's wives and there Mr. Hill discoursed with them and after he and Hill

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
