Report from the Committee of Laws ordered to be entered by

By the Committee of Laws Wednesday 2^d November 1709
As to the Law relating to poor Debtors &c it is the Opinion of this Committee that it will be convenient to make an Act of Assembly to suspend the Execution of the said Act till the End of the next Session of Assembly; And as to the Law against Importation of Bread and Flour &c it is the Opinion of this Committee that it will be best for the Interest of this Province to make a Law to allow the Importation of Indian Corn till the tenth of October next and not repeal the whole Law.

Signed by Order Dan. Dubany (Mr. Tom)
It is put to the Question whether it shall be suspended till next Session or not? Carried in the Affirmative And as to the Act against Importation of Bread and Flour put to the Question whether the whole Act be repealed or not? Carried in the Affirmative And resolved the Committee of Laws prepare a Bill to repeal the whole Law.

The Report of Mr. Bordley and Mr. Selegate relating to Acton's Petition read and debated and the Petition is rejected

Bill for Relief of Thomas Edmondson read the second Time and committed for Amendment. Col. Holland and Col. Courfey enter the House and deliver Mr. Speaker the following Message
