

Ordered That they bring in an Account of their particular Charge and lay before the House for further Consideration.

Moved by a Member whether it be not necessary that there be an Account given this Day of the quarter Part of the 1st of Feb^r appropriated for Arms etc

Resolved its absolutely necessary. Therefore Ordered Mr Bladon Clerk of the Habb^t Council be sent for. Mr Bladon accordingly appeared in the House and Mr Speaker required of him to render an Account to the House of the 3^d of Feb^r who declared his willingness thereto so far as he could and so withdraw. Soon after the Commission of the House Mr Bladon came in and delivered Mr Speaker Mr Plater and Mr Rousby's Accounts of the 3^d of Feb^r and so withdrew.

Then the aforesaid Accounts were given to the Gentlemen appointed to view the Arms etc who are required to inspect the said Accounts and report the same to the House by all convenient Speed.

The Petition of Madam Seymour for an Allowance for Hous^t Rent paid and Ordered the Committee of Accounts allow the same

Moved by a Member whether it be not for the Benefit and Interest of the Country to take off the C^t of Gallon Duty on Rum or no? Resolved Nominis contradicte^s That it is for the Benefit of the Country. And Ordered That a Bill be prepared that all Rum imported by Land or by Water as well in Vessels belonging to the Country as Foreigners pay 3^c of Gallon Duty and no more unless such Vessels as are owned by the Inhabitants of this Province and come directly from the West Indies —

And that the Act for 2^d of Gallon Duty on Rum be repealed

The Committee of Laws makes their Report to the House relating to Ordinary Licences Ordered to be Read which follows vizt

To the second Article in which Sir Thomas Lawrence only arbitrarily avers that the Benefit of Ordinary Licences were of the Lord Proprietary assigned to the Secretaries not as pretended by mere Favour to them as his Relations without any Proof but by an Exchange for Naval Officers Tolls; we do with more likelihood believe and are credibly informed that by command from his Excellency Lord Baltimore to his Son the now Lord Proprietary the Fine for Ordinary Licences was given to his Kinsman William Calvert Esq^r for his better Support without mentioning of such Exchange —

We find also that in the 1672, and how long before we know not the said present Lord Baltimore kept the Benefit of those Licences to himself and doubtless kept them so all the Time of Sir Thomas Lawrence, till William Calvert Esq^r his Kinsman was made Secretary; which shows it was done in Respect of Relations only, for such Ordinary Licences have no Affinity to the Offices nor does he put Pen to Paper for them
