

Bill empowering Commissioners to lay out lands for the Mantiche Indians Indorsed  
 By the Council October 30<sup>th</sup> 1711 This Bill has been read the first Time Whereupon it is  
 recommended to the House that the Lands be vested in some Persons and their Heirs capable  
 of taking for the use of those Indians the Public not being so and that there be a Clause  
 in the Law to bar Minors Tenmes (quest of) and to oblige the Court to return their  
 Proceedings to be recorded in the Secretary's Office and Somerset County Court Records

 The House adjourned till to morrow Morning Nine o'clock

 were present as yesterday except Mr. Vanderheyden who is sick

The Gents appointed to agree with Mr. Edwards to the Quarter Part of the Lot N<sup>o</sup> 37 -  
 Report that Mr. Edwards offered four Pounds for a free fimple Mr. Edwards appeared in  
 the House and agreed to pay four Pounds therefor and to pay the charge of the Act  
 Resolved the Committee of Laws draw a Bill to confirm the same to him -

Ordered Mr. Radwallader Edwards make good and sufficient Window Shutters for  
 all the windows in the Great House where wanting and lay his Accounts thereof before  
 this House, for which he shall be paid by the Public -

Bill relating to poor Debtors read with the Council's Indorsment debated and ordered  
 to be indorsed. By the House of Delegates 31<sup>st</sup> October 1711

The House concur with the Honble Council's Opinion that whatsoever has been done in  
 Pursuance of the former Law and until such Time as her Majesty's Disassent thereto  
 published here was, and is well done and ought not to be disputed in any Court of Judicature  
 but considering the different Opinion of the Judiciary think this Bill highly necessary  
 and at the Request of the Honble Council will not at present further proceed therein but  
 leave the Consideration thereof as the Honble Council desire
