 Read again in the House, the Amendments agreed to, and pass for ingrossing  
 Bill relieving the Inhabitants from some Aggrievances they lie under to  
 Indorsed, Eodem Die, Read in Council and will pass with the Amendments proposed  
 Read again in the House, the Amendments proposed by the Council, agreed to and  
 some further Amendments made by the House W Bladen C Council  
 Bill restraining the ill Practice of Sheriffs in executing Writs of fieri facias &c Indorsed  
 by the Council in Assembly Nov. 11<sup>th</sup> 1712 Read in Council and the Consideration  
 thereof referred to the next Session of Assembly. Signed & Order W Bladen C Council  
 Upon reading the said Indorsment Ordered the Bill be again indorsed—

 Mr. Hill, Mr. Broome, Mr. Leach, Mr. James Marshall, Mr. Jones, Mr. Hammond, Mr. Mountain  
 and Mr. Doorn. They return and say they delivered the Bills  
 The Honble Cos Greenberry and Cos Tilghman enter the House and deliver Mr. Speaker  
 the Journal of the Committee of Accounts and the following Message

By the Council in Assembly Nov. 12<sup>th</sup> 1712

On Perusal of the Journal of the Committee of Accounts we find several Mistakes  
 therein which will be remarked to you by the Messengers herewith sent. We cannot  
 see what Reasons you have reject the Allowances usually made the Members of this House  
 for their Attendance and Assistance in the High Court of Chancery and recommend it  
 to your Consideration that the wonted Allowances be made them  
 The Honble President advanced ~~ten~~ Dollars to Mr. Broome the Messenger sent from  
 Virginia by Governor Spotswoods Express with the publick Satchets and her Majestys  
 Proclamation for the Redemption of Arrows agreed with France which Money we desire  
 may be repaid his Honour out of the Treasury Signed & Order W Bladen C Council  
 Upon Reading and debating this Message Ordered the Journal be rectified and the  
 Message Answered as follows By the House of Delegates 19<sup>th</sup> Nov. 1712  
 We have ordered the Errors in the Journal of the Committee of Accounts to be rectified  
 and the Honble President ten Dollars to be allowed him. But as to allowing such  
 of your Honours Accounts as attended in the Court of Chancery we cannot allow them  
 it being contrary to the Act of Assembly. And we are of Opinion that the Profits of  
 the Office of keeping the Seal is sufficient to defray the Charge and Expenses of the Judges  
 there without burthening the Public
