The House adjourns till to morrow morning nine o'clock

Tuesday Nov. 9th 1713 The House met according to Adjournment and being called over were present as yesterday only Mr. Ward being sick. Read what was done yesterday Col. Whittington from the Council enters the House and delivers Mr. Speaker the Journal of the Committee of Accounts appointed by the Council and a Message that the Honorable Council had appointed Col. Greenberry and Col. Whittington to join the members of this House to apponion the publick Levy. Thereupon ordered the members of this House join them. The Honorable Col. Addison and Col. Tilghman deliver Mr. Speaker the following Message vizt

By the Honorable President and Council in Assembly Nov. 9th 1713
 On Saturday last the Honorable President received a Letter from the Right Honorable the Lords of Trade and Plantations of the 15th of July wherein is the following Clause vizt The Acts which we have sent shall be considered at the first Opportunity and our Opinion thereupon transmitted to you. In the mean Time we must observe upon the Act for regulating Appeals from and to the Courts of Common Law within this Province that by her Majesty's Instructions you are required to Endeavour to get a Law passed where the Method and Limitation of Appeals from the inferior Courts to the Governor and Council may be settled and restrained but you are not to enact any thing that her Majesty has already settled by her Instructions. And therefore all that Clause in the aforesaid Act which relates to Appeals from the Governor and Council to her Majesty ought to be left out the same being sufficiently provided for as aforesaid. We advise you therefore to endeavour to get a new Law passed without the said Clause also we shall be glad you should lay the same before her Majesty for her Disallowance or otherwise therefore recommend to you to recommend that Law this Session agreeable to her Majesty's said Intimation omitting the Clause directing Appeals to her Majesty.
