May it please your Excellency and Honour,

On Consideration of your Excellency & Honour

Message of Yesterday by the Honble Colo Coursoy we find that our Message of the 19th by Major Ward and others only signified our Intent that such Cases should be by Law settled on his Majesty to the Uses therein mentioned and that our Consent ~~to~~ to such a Law necessary to give it being according to our present Constitution and hope that expressing such our Consent may not be understood as insisting on, or claiming any Thing belonging to the Prerogative - We therefore only pray if your Excellency approves of the Law in the said Message as proposed that such your Approbation be notified to us that a Bill may be prepared accordingly.
