

in his Right of Government nor were appointed to by his Lordship he does not think
a Base to him from Executing his Lordship Commission which when he received
it did not enter into his thoughts, That his Lordship's Government would require me
of him then their Governor under the Crown ever did for these 25 years past,
during which time he has had the honour to serve his Lordship and the people of
this Province without reproach and he believes that his faithful Services and
the Interest of his accounts with his Lordship's Ministers was the only Inducement
his Lordship had to Committe the receipt of the revenue of this Province rather
to his care then to others who perhaps were not so well known in the family.

To what is desired he answers that his Lordship has not yet appointed
any Surveyor Gentle Privy Council there can be no Deputy Surveyors, but his
Lordship and the Lord Guilford his Guardian have sent in 12 Persons for
Surveyors with Directions to plant them to protestants in such Countries where
his Lordships Surveyors places were usually Executed by Protestants while the
Government was in the Crown and that upon the death or just cause of removal
of any such Surveyors or any other Officer or Officers in Office usually held by
Protestants none should be sent in their Roomes but protestants, but none of the
said Persons are as yet placed because Mr. Walter Lee and Mr. Henry Somers
who have the Distribution of the said Persons having mett with Some dis-
appointment therein from the Government as they say for which reason his
Lordship and the people of this Province suffer much Detriment and the like
Officer is in great thereby putt up for the issuing Marrants for taking up
land without Surveyors to execute them would be but a charge & no purpose.

Observations on Mr. Carroll's answer to John Ducke's put to him on

the 19th July 1716.

To the First Duke of Dorset after answering that he said nothing to this
Letter about the acts of the 12 and 15th of King Charles the second in the
Queens specified add he was very well satisfied that there was nothing in them but
that would hinder the Lord Proprietary as his Secretary Governor of Maryland from
Planting the Colony.

In objection thereto It is plain by his Majestys Royal instructions under his hand
and being signed the Governor John Hart by name is Design'd to take care
of and appoint the naval Officers in the Province, and it cannot be understood
by the Act of the 15th of King Charles that the Secretary Governor who has
never been in the Province being wholly resident in Great Britain should appoint
such Officers or take the oath in the act mentioned but the Governors or Admirals
in Chief of the Lands Islands Plantations Colonies or Territories in America
and such as his Excellency John Hart Esq; being on the Spot at that Person
are not his Lord Proprietary or the Lord Guilford who are not in this Province.
(To the Second Duke of Dorset) Carroll answer is also gather from his

Question whether he too the Secretary to the Govt he would take the oath
when he came upon the place where he was to execute the said Commission
