

on the 31<sup>st</sup> of July last on a Bill for making good a title of land from Joseph Bridger alled to Thomas Jones etc. &c. and in answer thereto was the following Indisment to be made of Origi:

By the Lower house of Assembly 23. Augt 1795.  
In answer to your Indisment on this Bill whereby you desire to be satisfied how and when Mr. Thomas Jones dec<sup>d</sup> payed the consideration money of £1000 to Shaking Tree amonr you that Hester Bridger the widow and late of Joseph Bridger Esq<sup>r</sup> deceased after the death of her said Joseph Bridger did by her under her hand and seal bearing date the 3<sup>d</sup> day of July 1686 make in sent to your house with this Bill acknowledge the receipt of the said Consideration and thereof discharged the said Thomas Jones and it cannot be denied but she had power so to do; and more over those that opposed the passing of the bill in this house owned that all the Consideration money is about £8000 that was paid by the said Thomas Jones in his lifetime and since the said Jones by his last will gave all his personal Estate to his wife except some small legacies which Estate amounted to above £3000 sterl and one but few debts which also apprass his act. Last that she or Mrs. Catherine Talbot has that State of marrying her should pay his debts whereof the said 3000<sup>l</sup> was part wherefore it is hoped the bill will pass. Signed by order

By the Up<sup>r</sup> house of Assembly Augt 2<sup>d</sup> 1795  
It being recommended by his Excellency the Governor to this house that by the opinion of the Rt Honble the Lord Proprietary and his Guardian's Agent in England their Lordships have not yet sent any Instructions or authority into this Province either in case of the death or absence of the Governor where the powers of the Government shall be lodged or who shall execute the same, That as his Excellency's health is violent fit of sickness there may happen great prejudice and confusion among the people upon his death if it should please God to thos<sup>d</sup> die before the Lord Proprietary and his Guardian by some special instruction make provision therefore. This house doe unanimously resolve that the not holding into this Province such powers and Instructions to Government death or absence is a great omission in his Lordships Agent and conceive that the ill consequences of such neglect at present cannot be otherwise provided for than by an Act of Assembly directing where the said powers shall be lodged and how executed until his Lordship the Rt Honble the Lord Proprietary and his Guardians direction and Instructions shall be sent into this Province on what emergent occasion we desire the advice and concurrence of your
