It answers to your Message this day by Lord John Young and John Hall Esq.  
about the heads and scalps of Genl. and Squibell, We agree to the bringing  
in a supplementary bill empowering and requiring every Magistrate  
before whom any squibell or Genl's heads are produced to require seasonable  
proofs to the Best of the payments knowledge that they were killed in the  
County before any Certificate shall be given and to see such heads or scalps  
burnt but to oblige the Payments to go to court would be a means to  
discourage many from killing the said Genl's for persons living at a great  
distance from the Court will hardly think it worth while to carry a few heads  
thither and we also agree that a clause shall be inserted that no squibell or  
Genl's head or scalps killed by Indians be paid for all which His honors will  
prevent the Country being impeded or hindered by the Macnemara P. L. O. R.  
Sent to the upper house by Mayr Wilson, Mr. Tubbitt Mr. Pitt &  
Capt Greenfield. They return and say they delivered it.
