I fear his Lordship expects that the 15 mentioned page the 14<sup>th</sup> shall be made payable to himself or what person he shall appoint to receive the same and agrees that 3<sup>d</sup> thereof shall be a Rouse be applied for furnishing arms and ammunition &c.

The words by him appointed page 15 interlined more better & find and thereby more Respect shew'd his Lordship

In the last Feb<sup>r</sup> but one the Rouse for Relinquishing T<sup>o</sup> is very unreasonable and giving up his whole Revenue in Consideration of the duty he expects without Payment for if his Lordship should agree to the Rouse and a Grant should happen and a 1<sup>st</sup> be first taken his Lordship with his five Brethren and Sisters may want a support for that year which doubtless yous Hon<sup>rs</sup> would mind have,

I. Rouse obliging the 1<sup>st</sup> of the Provincial court & the several 1<sup>st</sup> of the respective Counties to transmit yearly to his Lordship's agent for this time being a full list of all alienations recorded in any of their offices and that he officio and under a certain penalty
