

*P* Question a bill solemnly past by us and matter is *That*  
the Courts before whom he pleaded having considered his be-  
haviour the Judges whereof were the proper persons to censure  
the behaviour of their own Officers, the Admirance of him to a  
hearing would have been sitting in Question the Decency of  
those Judges without Cause and making them parties by rather  
Dependants to his Complaint in matters whereof the Law  
makes them Judges, and where the facts they accused him of  
were notorious.

*W*e must beg leave on this Occasion to Declare  
that we do preferre the very Essence of Authority and Govern-  
ment to be indeed so nearly concerned in this affair, that it  
shall be the least Countenance of Encouragement given to any Law-  
yer to Deny subjecting his Demerits to the Judgment  
of the Courts he pretends in to contend with with them  
concerning it, and care to put the whole Country upon  
being silent in Great Britain, where it seems the truth of their  
Allegations are full in Question, and which they cannot  
with Convenience appear their to prove. *And*  
if where such Misapprehensions pay the Legislature needs assist  
in the regulation of such practices by punishing those who  
are the most notorious offenders in this sort. *And*  
that neither Courts nor Country can be treated with Indig-  
ny of the *Some* such manner, should be necessary  
to be considered (with all humble Submission to the Justice of  
a Constitution) cannot deserve the Charge of it, and support  
not be charged the subject of Reasoning, and we shall  
wonder how it may be a Swindler at Law yet why acts as  
an Attorney here who has been generally ~~the~~ Town Believed  
to the whole Province) by which the same means as being superior  
ought to have right to do with any Attorney that misbehaves himself before  
them.

*W*e cannot think the thing necessary

if the person that has been so commended in instances  
as that Law mentions shall be able to justify his in Conduct  
in Disregard of the Government and Country.
