

We have Examined into his Conduct and do not find he has Done any more than his Duty But forasmuch as we have reason to believe that the Conclusion of the Honble Comm^{rs} Afore Said proved from the want of a Careful Representation of their Affairs being Laid before them we therefore the more Earnestly press your Concurrence w^{ch} in a matter of so great Importance to the welfare of the Inhabitants of this Province being of Opinion that it may be safe and better to prevent an Aggrievance than to be put to the necessity of Seeking redress after we have Suffered itt

We Cannot Conceive that the Debt being Sold on Mr Macnamaras Death Can be any Security against the Like Aggrievances for the future because Undoubtedly those Persons who have purchased these Debts (if any such there be) will be very vigilant for the recovery of them, we have too much reason to fear they may readily be Satisfied wth some Person to prosecute them whose Principles & Practices may be as pernicious as Mr Macnamaras

We Take this Matter to be yet of more Concern to this Province since his Excellency the Govern^r our then Chancellor seems Charged by the said Com^{rs} wth Obstructing his Mag^{ts} Service in these matters He acted no otherwise in relation thereto than as Judge in Chancery and we must account it a most fatal Error to Impartial Justice if the Conscience of our Judges should be Influenced by any power to a Conformity wth any Interest What ever the Consequences Depend on
