And being we are well assured, We should have been happy under the Administration  
of your last Councilor notwithstanding the Malicious reports of his Envy on account  
of his former Attachment: to your Lordships Interest ~~to be~~ - So we pass leave to  
show that the reason suggested to your Lordships would not have been of equal  
Weight with us so as to induce us to desire a Change. Yet they are well corroborated  
by the Especial Favour your Lordships have been pleased to confer on us viz

The Appointment of a Gentleman to Rule over us of strict  
Adherence to the Protestant Interest known Loyalty to the King and We daily  
believe a Well wisher to your Lordships Government and the Happiness of your  
People here, And we are persuaded Conform to your Lordships desire and his own  
good Inclination he will exert himself in his Endeavours of healing our late  
Divisions by which we shall (like good Christians) be United in Order to consult your  
Lordships Interest and the Common Good - And we are persuaded our dissenting  
Brethren of what denomination soever will enjoy such Indulgence as can  
Reasonably be allowed them so we have Just reason to believe they will think themselves  
happy under the same and thereby be prevented from giving disturbances to the Govern-  
ment or Unnecessary to themselves

We are sensibly touched on account of the seeming dissatisfaction your  
Lordship is pleased to Express on account of the late Regulation of Officers Fees being  
firmly assured, were your Lordship truly apprised of the large sum the Fees of the  
Several Offices amount unto, your Lordship would, in all probability Incline to assent  
to that Regulation which we may Justly affirm (by Reason of the great Number of people  
in the Province) amounts to much more now than they did when the former Act was made  
which (in the Judgment of Every Distinguishing Person here) are abundantly sufficient  
for the necessary Support of your Lordships Great Officers, a handsome Maintenance to the  
Lepers, and a sufficient Encouragement to every of them to discharge the duties incumbent  
on them, To which reasons we humbly take leave to subjoyn the proposal of the poorer  
Sort of your Lordships People have long laboured under by Reason of their Extravagan-  
t Fees by the first Law, so that on due Consideration of the whole, We have  
reason still to believe your Lordship will not Incline to dissent to a Just  
Regulation

It is also a great Satisfaction that your Lordship is pleased to approve the  
We have made of Mr. Blackstone for our Agent a Person who hath long pleasingly served us in

Mr. Fitchman from the Upper house delivers Mr. Speaker the following Message  
viz - By the Upper and Lower Houses of Assembly October the 27: 1720  
On the Petition of Richard Thatcher against Matthew Wallace, we bearing the facts  
on both sides, is ordered that the said Richard Thatcher be restored to his full Quiet and  
peaceable possession of in and into the Lands whereof he was lately dispossessed by the said  
Matthew Wallace or his Lessee by Virtue of a Writ of Possession issued from the East  
Provincial Court and that the Sheriff of each County shall make Restitution accordingly  
and also ordered that all persons concerned in the Disputes of the said Lands prepare themselves  
for a more full and ample hearing at the next Sessions and that the Parties wait further  
the Determination thereof
