it or having it secured shall be six hundred pounds of Tobacco or not carried in the Negative
Then the Question was put whether the fine shall be four hundred or not carried in the
affirmative - A supplementary bill to the Act to prevent making trashy Tobacco
was read the first time and ordered to lye on the table - An Engrout bill for Cont
Process in Baltimore County Court was read and reported to and was so Endorsed and sent
to the Upper house by Mr. Tolley and Mr. Hamilton - they return & say they delivered it
the house Adjourns till to Morrow Morning Nine of the Clock

Tuesday October the 30th the house meets according to Adjournment, yesterday's proceedings
are read - the bill for the better relief of poor Debtors was read with the Amendments
and ord^d to be thus Endorsed viz^t By the Lower house of Assembly October the 30th 1722

we thought it more eligible to have one wholly Transcribed than to send up the
old bill to your Hon^{rs} with the many Blots and Inter lincations that could not be

Place of paym^t precarious no one would agree with them for that Comoditie but at
Extravagant rates, w^{ch} is the true reason that the records are not yet repaired. Therefore
we propose to your house that a Clause be added in the bill empowering the
Com^{rs} to agree with proper persons either in Money or tobacco with which

there upon the bill is Committed for amendment which is accordingly amended and
sent for Engraving - On reading the Supplementary bill to the Act to prevent
making trashy Tobacco - the Question was put whether a time for planting
shall be limited or not carried in the Negative - Then the Question was put whether
the fine on bad Tobacco shall be pound for pound or two hundred p^{ts} of 100 p^{ts} of fine
Resolved that it be two hundred p^{ts} of tobacco of fine where upon the bill was read
the first & second times by special Order was past & was so Endorsed & sent to the Upper
house by Mr. Stoddart and five Others - they return and say they delivered it
