

- 1900<sup>th</sup> October, consideration the Conference Report is at their Opinion  
 1 That one School be Erected at some convenient place in Every County —  
 2 That there be Seven persons Appointed by Act of Assembly for every County as Visitors of the  
 School of that County, whereof the Major part to be enabled to act in case of Death or absence to  
 perpetuate their succession in the same Manner as is provided for the Preschool Officers. if they be a Body Politick  
 3 That such Visitors purchase some convenient parcel of Land for the use of such School to contain  
 One hundred Acres of Land or there abouts & that as near as they can other half thereof may be  
 fit for a small Pasture and Cornfield and the rest for wood Land & for keeping the fenceing in  
 repair spending fine wood but that none of that Wood be reserved for woodland be cleared by any Master —  
 Otherwise than for use and unless by consent of the Visitors in any Master both freed from all tobacco Master  
 4 That in case such Land have not convenient House for a School Master to live & teach School  
 in that the Visitors provide such house but that especial care be taken that such Settlement be made  
 for them as such place in each County as may be most convenient for the Boarding of Children  
 5 That the Visitors take proper Methods to Encourage good School masters capable of teaching grammar  
 & the Mathematick is such far conveniently be got that they allow such Master twenty p. Ann for the  
 present & take such Other Measures or make such Other Arrangements from time to time for the future as  
 may give due Encouragement to a Master & be useful for the perpetuating such Schools —  
 6 That visitors meet at such School at least four times in the year to inspect & consider the affairs thereof  
 7 That such visitors draw on the first day of February for the sumes required in w<sup>ch</sup> Exacted Lands  
 the Money shall go to Answer their Draught according to their proportion & that the Visitors  
 be empowered to dispose of the said Money from time to time as shall be most for y<sup>r</sup> advancement of such School  
 8 That the Visitors keep fair Accts. of their Disbursements all other proceedings shall be subject to y<sup>r</sup> Examination  
 of the General Assembly for any Miseries and go under 500 £ fine for Delay or refusal  
 to execute such Trust and likewise to take the Oaths and the like Oaths for the executing  
 their Office as taken by the Visitors of Annapolis School —  
 9 That the Money already raised be Divided into twelve Equal parts and part thereof  
 assigned to each County to be Disposed of by the Visitors ap —  
 10 That such Visitors be empowered to make such Rules for Governing regulating the S. Schools in such manner  
 as may best Answer y<sup>r</sup> Interest and End of both in respect to Masters and Schools —

which was read and referred for further Consideration — the House Adj<sup>d</sup> t<sup>o</sup> Monday Morning next of the Month of  
 Friday Nov<sup>th</sup> 2<sup>d</sup> 1722 the House meets according to Adjournment — Yesterday days proceedings are read —

On Reading the Petition of the Ordinary Hooper the Question was put whether any further P. Law  
 shall be made them not carried in the Negatives — Whereupon the both are rejected —  
 A Bill for Limitation of Actions of Trespass & Detainment was read the first and second times by Special  
 Order against H. Morris Contradictor which was so endorset and sent to the Upper house by  
 Mr. Taylor and Mr. Gant — They return and say they delivered it —

A Bill for the relief of some persons that have suffered by the Misconception of the Laws —  
 heretofore made to regulate the Making of Tobacco was read the first and second times by Special  
 order and sent which was so endorset and sent to the Upper house by Mr. Jordan & Mr. Walker  
 They return and say they delivered it — An Engrat bill directing how fines shall be adjudged  
 against such as refuse to appear at Assizes — & an Engrat bill to prevent the clandestine  
 running of Tobacco into the British Colonies were read and referred to Committee  
 so endorset and sent to the Upper house by Mr. King & Capt. Hooper — They return & say they  
 delivered them —

Resolved that the Treasurer of the Astorians those sent for two  
 Doz<sup>s</sup> of the best bound blank Books for record books of good paper & the binding to  
 be as weak fortified as may be for Duration to be broad books but not above three inches
