By His Excellency the Gov. and Council in Assembly (May 25th 1715.

On consideration of the Bill now proposed for ascertaining what
Damages shall be allowed on protested bills of Exchange, His Excellency
was pleased to Communicate unto us one of the Royall Instructions by
Article 17/ particularly relating to bills of Exchange and enjoining his
Excellency not to pass or give his assent to any Law wherein the property of
any of his Majesty's Subjects of Great Britain may be Concerned unless
there be a proviso therein that it shall not be in force till after twelve
Months in time of peace and Eighteen in time of War.

Whereupon wee Resolved that the said Instruction be Communicated
unto your House and doe Recommend that such Clause by way of
Proviso be added to the afo. Bill ascertaining what Damages shall
be allowed on Protested bills of Exchange -
