

in Chief of the Lands, Islands, Plantations, Colonies or Territories in America, and specially his Excellency John Hart Esq: being one the first of that person and not only Lord Provo^r or the Lord Guilford who are not in this Province.

To the second Que^r Mr. Carroll's answer is all together to this question whether he told the Secretary to the Com^t what he would take the Oath, when he came upon the place where he was to execute the said Commission is not answering directly whether he did or not, but saying that he did not tell the Secretary of the Com^t what he would do when he came upon the place of executing his Commission because he thought it needless to tell him he would do what was necessary and yet at the same time Mr. Carroll might tell the Secretary he would take the Oath on the place of executing the Com^t but because that he did not tell him all that he would do as regards the said Com^t's appoint Deputy in the several parts and he answered he did not tell him what he would do.

2^d Que^r In his answer to part of the same Que^r (vizt) whether he ever informed the Com^t of his M^t Customs that he was a Roman Catholic he does not answer whether he did or not do so but argued by saying the Commission of the Customs did not require him to make a profession of his faith &c: that he believes it would be looked upon as impertinent in him to go about it before that board and yet at the same time he might have made such profession.

To the third Que^r how he came to take upon him the office of Escheator Genl in this Province (which is an office of Record) and the office of Naval Officer as well as Receiver General of the publick Revenue of this Province when he knew his intention of not taking the Oath of Allegation required by the act of Assembly of this Province which has been since tendered to him and he has refused to take and subscribe.

He answers that he took offices upon him in the Que^r mentioned because he has for some years past been trusted with all of them which lay in the Prof^r of Ancestors to grant without being in the least called in question on any act while the Government was immediately in the Crown - When at the same time it is known to all the publick Officers here that he never was appointed or exercised the offices of Escheator Genl. Naval Officer General or the receiver General (of the Lord Prof^r exercising the Government of this Province) before he obtained the present Commission by which he now claims those offices.

It is further remarked that as to the act of Assembly which requires all officers here to take the oath of Allegation mentioned in the said Que^r the time of enacting the said law is in the said
