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wellfare of our Country, the want whereof is too evident among us,
and we reflect how glorious your Excellency has been in promoting Learning
for us and how wanting we have been to consider in that part we can
serve. We prefer to use the approach of those we dissent. But we must
beg leave to charge that our Committee on the first Discrepancy we have
already mett with in having Money that we raised in this Province,
applied to the Maintaining a School in a noted by which never anyone
inhabitant of this has received the least advantage.

This manner of application we are persecuted had never been used
had not our neighbour in Virginia made some Misch representation
concerning it, if we could be so happy by your Excellency's assistance to
leave this case truly stated and a proper application made for Redress
we should not doubt success from the Justice of our Case and then we
should with Chearfulness exert ourselves in the endeavour to make
such an Establishment as might give our present youth and Prospects an
opportunity of Learning.

In the interim we shall be glad to embrace all opportunity
to support the poor School that may not be too burthenome to the
Publick and should be glad to receive such Proposals as the poor
Rector and visitors shall think fit to make for our assistance in y^r the
consideration of what so important an affair.

We shall immediately proceed to do what may be proper in
respect to the regulation of Ordinaries.

We again acknowledge their S^t Great goodness particularly in
the regard they have had to y^r preservation of our Constitution and
the continuing your Excellency's Govt. over us of whose Loyalty, Fidelity
Honesty and Justice we have had so ample an experience that we
cannot esteem this the least of their S^t favours especially since by the
Influence of your Excellency's administration and example we are encouraged
with all freedom to demean ourselves as becomes a People truly Loyall
to his Majesty - Dutifull to their S^t and just to our Country.
