Rents and alienation fines (which we take to be the first of two Philz. pth<sup>4</sup>) is to be esteemed a favour especially since your Lordships Design is still for the relief of the poor and more indigent part of the people a regard that justly obliges us to be dutifully thankful, and when we consider such a sense of obligation it is with pleasure we reflect on M<sup>r</sup>. Agreeable Expedient that at once renders the receipt of your Appellents advantageous and easy to your L<sup>s</sup>ps and at the same time encourages the Improvement of your L<sup>s</sup>ps Dominion by making the payment easy to the people - On this occasion we humbly beseech that M<sup>r</sup>. Money will be appropriated to y<sup>e</sup> Support of your Lordships Government has formerly been and yet is raised on no other Considerations y<sup>e</sup> we can think of than the necessity of having the Government support to y<sup>e</sup> the former goods of it self and y<sup>e</sup> people, the only Goods we desire it to be applied to and tho' we are under no apprehension of a Misapplication thereof under y<sup>e</sup> your Lordships present Establishment, and have therefore in great measure conformed to the Directions Given by your L<sup>s</sup>ps, yet we must beg leave humbly to offer y<sup>e</sup> w<sup>t</sup> as it seems but reasonable as we bear a part in the raising that revenue for the Support of Govern<sup>m</sup> it may be thought our duty to take care of the application of it for as we shall always esteem it our duty to be Faithfull to your L<sup>s</sup>ps we must in Compliance therewith be just to our Country.

May it please Your L<sup>s</sup>ps -

Your Lordships Instructions relating to ordinary offences had been communicated to us this session by your Lordships Lieut. Governor by which your Lordships are pleased to insist upon the fines to be laid upon Ordinary keepers as a right to your L<sup>s</sup>ps by prerogative, on which we observe our predecessors in all the proceedings Assembly's of the late Reign have maintained their pretensions that such fines could not be imposed or levied without the Consent of the people here - against the most pressing importunities of the late Secretary tho' he had obtained the late May 17<sup>th</sup> in Council in his favour when the Government of this Province was immediately under the Crown.

We presume your L<sup>s</sup>ps Secretary are not unacquainted with the reasons then offered in your favour and we hope they may have yet some weight,

We should think ourselves justly liable to y<sup>e</sup> censure of those we represent if we should now give up to your Lordships
