

upon his application to us against the said Order we have declared that he ought to make a reasonable Submission before he should be restored to his practice there, and the said Thomas Maenemara having lately made a satisfactory Submission to us the said Lords propra we have thought fitt that the said Suspension be taken off And do hereby Order and Direct that you the said John Hart our Lieutenant Governour and Keeper of the great Seale of the Province or in your absence the Keeper of the great Seale of the Province for the time being do forthwith discharge the said Order and all Orders Explanatory thereof, and restore the said Tho. Maenemara to his practice in the said Court

His Excellency's Speech in Councill at the delivering up the Great Seales of this Province
(Gentlemen)

I must Confes myself surpris'd at the Manner of proceeding to restore Mr. Maenemara by a formall precept to his practice before me, without making a due Submission to me who was personally affronted in the Execution of that office wherein I represented the Lords Proprietayr

I say I am surpris'd because I find this precept (or order or whatever Denomination it may go under for it is a novelty) contrary to their Lordships Sundry Letters that signified their approbation (even with) of what I had done in that matter, that Mr. Maenemara ought not to be restored till he made his due Submission to me, and now to find their Lordships order him to be restored without so much as a Letter from them to me on an Occasion (which surely was not trifling) do's indeed amaze me, and certainly the Support of the Magistrats will Deserve your attention at least

That affronts were given me by Maenemara (and to whom in a publick Station were they not given by that Man of Infamous and Insolent Memory) in the Execution of my office is admitted

These were (virtually) affronts to his Lordships but they were such actually to me, and tho' I doubt not but his Submission to
