His Excellency the Governour our then Chancery seems charged by the  
said Commissioners with obstructing His Majesties Service in these matters.  
He acted no otherwise in relation thereto than as Judge in Chancery and  
we must account it a most fatal enemy to Impartial Justice if the  
Consciences of our Judges should be influenced by any power to a  
conformity with any Interest whatever - the Consequence deserve your  
Consideration -
