The inconveniences that arise on the Act to Limit the Conveniency of Auctions &c, some of them we doubt not will be made evident unto you by the consideration of such magistrates and other Court Officers as sit in your House but by those of this House that are concerned in Courts we are well satisfied that there are great injuries done the subjects by the necessity the Court are now under of giving Judgment against such as are hindred in their causes by the new law of procedure by Officers of magistrates or other Officers or parties or their Com^r or other unforeseen and inevitable casualties of which last have some
