

The motion being made and the question being put whether the Act of last  
session for the importation of bread, peas, & flavin, should be repealed or not  
it was carried in the Affirmative and ordered that the Committee of Laws  
prepare a Bill for the repeal thereof, and ordered that the following message  
be prepared. (viz) By the Lower House of Assembly, October 15 1730  
May it please your Honor.

In answer to your message of this day by Thomas Borden and James  
Dawkins Esqrs on the Act to limit the continuance of Auctions &c. this House  
having examined into that Law, cannot proceed any more  
to attend it but if any should be as your House hath observed we desire  
your Commencement thereof to us, that we likewise may consider thereof  
which accordingly was prepared and sent to the Upper House by Mr  
Hall and Mr. Eick, who return and say they have delivered

The Petition of Charles Nixon praying to be released from prison as  
the bail of Charles Carroll Esq. his Esq. was read and ordered that  
notice be given to the said Esq. to appear this afternoon to make his ob-  
jections (if any there be)

The Esq. of Charles Carroll Esq. appearing and making their  
objections to the said Petition which objections seeming reasonable to this  
House, the Petition is rejected. A bill for repealing an Act of Assembly  
entitled an Act, prohibiting the importation of bread, peas &  
from Pennsylvania was read the first and second times (by special order  
and pass and being so endorsed, was sent to the Upper House by John  
Hall and Mr. Taylor, who return and say they have delivered it

The Petition of the Vestry of William & Mary Parish Charles  
County referred from the last session to this was read, and the  
allegations of all parties by their respective Councils being heard,

The question was put whether the same shall be rejected or  
not it was carried in the Affirmative to which upon the petition is  
Rejected and so endorsed. John Hall and Thelmaugh Loyd Esqrs  
deliver Mr. Speaker the following message, viz. By the Upper House  
of Assembly October 15 1730 Gentlemen

The inconveniences that  
arise on the Act to limit the continuance of Auctions &c. and some  
of them no doubt will be made evident unto you, by the obs-  
ervation of such Magistrates and other Court Officers as sit in  
your House but by those of this House that are concerned in Courts  
we are well satisfied that there are great injuries done the subjects  
by the necessity the Court are under of giving Judgment against  
such as are hindered in their causes by the new kind of procedure  
by Lieutenants of Magistrates or other Officers or of parties or their Execu-  
tives, or other unforeseen and inevitable casualties of which we have  
some
