 John Delgman gave the Upper House Petition Mr. Speaker a Bill for relief of such as have suffered by the Tobacco Law that Endors'd Viz. By the Upper House of Assembly Nov 1. 1722  
 Gentlemen had his bill been to relieve some particular persons or persons that may have been oppressed by a misconstruction of the Laws for regulating the making of Tobacco. we should readily have concurred with you in conceiving proper measures to redress them but it being generally to stay all Executions that have been awarded against any person who shall concern him or them selves, aggrieved by such Execution until heard & Determined by the County Court. we are of opinion that it will not only countenance Lord Cancellors, where there is no just cause, for complaints and likewise give a handle for applications of the same nature to future Assemblies and thereby discourage all persons from putting those Laws in Execution which if rightly understood and duly Executed will in all likelyhood be of good service to the trade of this province and therefore can't consent to pass this Bill
