We of the Committee, having inspected, and duly examined the Indentures of fames Harris, Esq. Mr. Philip Kennard, and Mr. George Wilson, three of the Members return'd to Serve in this Sessions, for Kent County; do find them duly Elected. And we having received a Petition, from sundry the Inhabitants of Kent County, complaining of the undue Election of Capt. Ebenezer Blackisson, and having heard the Allegations of both Parties, and takenthe Depositions of the Evidences to us produced, relating thereto, do find, that the Contest lay between Capt. Ebenezer Blackisson, and Mr. John Johnson, and that the said Capt. Blackisson, carryed the Election by one Voice, (which had the Sheriff allowed the Voice of Messieurs William Nicholson, and James Calder, two of the Evidences) must have been determined in Favour of Mr. Johnson; but your Committee is of Opinion, that the said Mr. James Calder, was not entituled to Vote at the said Election; and it being a Doubt with your Committee, whether the said William Nicholson, was qualified to Vote, and also for that Nicholas Waterman, one of the Persons Scrutinized on the Poll, for Capt. Blackisson, was afterwards allowed on the Poll for Mr. John Johnson, which we think ought not to be allowed, but that the said Nicholas Waterman, should only stand good on the Poll, of the said Capt. Blackissone, being first Scrutinized for him. Therefore we are surther of Opinion, that should the Voice of the said William Nicholson, be allowed good, Capt. Ebenezer Blackissone, is duly Elected, all which we humbly Submit to the Consideration of the House. Which Report being Read, the House concur therewith. And thereupon are of Opinion, that Capt. Ebenezer Blackissone, is justly entituled to fi in this House, to serve as a Delegate for Kent County.
