Gentlemen, Mr. Charles Carroll having petition'd this House to be heard, against a Bill for Relief of poor Prisoners, produc'd a Bill of Sale or Mortgage (which is herewith sent) from Nathaniel Wright, one of the Prisoners in the said Bill mention'd; for Four Negroes, which said Negroes, notwithstanding they became forfeited to him, he saith were by the stid Nathaniel disposed of, or conveyed away, fo that he the said Charles, could never find or recover them. We therefore think it reasonable, that a Clause be added to the said Bill, obliging the said Nanathiel to declare upon Oath, before he is releas'd from his Imprisonment, what became of those Negroes, whether they are living or dead, and if living, in whose Possession they are, and by what Right held. We likewise think it necessary, that Samuel Stephens, a Criminal Prisoner in Anne-Arundel County Prison, be obliged to give Security for his good Behaviour during his Continuance in this Province, before he is released: With which Additions this Bill will pass.
