charge what they pleafe, for the Services to be done by them: We agree with you, that Examiner and Surveyor General, are not both Necoffary for the Service of the Country, & Examiner is much the more Necessary of the Two, whose Office it is to correct Erroll veys, which if not done, may be of dangerous Consequence to the Country; but forasmuch Address to his Lordship for that End; and in the mean Time, we defire you again, to consider, that it will be necessary to regulate their Fees.

We also remind you, to alter the Time of Payment to be made in Money to Officers, proposed

to be the Tenth of April, which was omitted in your Message.
