Read a second Time, and will pass, the Preamble in the following Words being added thereto, viz. Whereas, at a Session of Assembly Leld at the City of Annapolis, Anno 1707, there was an Ast passed, to prevent, amongst other Things, the clipping of all sorts of Foreign Coins; but forasmuch, as such Coins both of Gold or Silver do at this Time pass Current by Weight, and not by Tale, as heretosore, whereby the Mischiefs of Clipping are effectually prevented: And seeing, that cutting or clipping of Foreign Coins is now, in some Measure necessary for the making of Change; this present General Assembly taking into their serious Consideration the grievous Penalties inflicted by the said Ast, upon Persons clipping Foreign Coins as aforesaid, have thought sit to repeal so much of the said Act as relates thereunto, Wherefore be it Enasted, &c.

Sign'd per Order, John Ross, Cl. Up. Ho. The Bill Intituled, An Act for the more effectual punishing of New groes, and other Slaves, and for taking away the Benefit of Clergy, from certain Offenders, was read the first and second Time, and order'd to pais. And sent to the Upper House by Messicurs Robert Hanson, and William Stoughton; who return and say they deliver'd the same.
