This Confideration has put us as well upon examining the lite Tobacco Law, correcting some Things in it that we conceive to be amis, and making some further Provision to render it more effectual; as also upon considering the Advantages which would probably result from concerting Measures with our Neighbours of Virginia, (who depend upon the Produce of Tobacco as well as we do.) to raise the Price of our Staple. And this House being unanimously of Opinion, That a Friendly Correspondence with Virginia, to the Ends already mentioned, would be very advantageous to both Countries; We defire your Honours will appoint some of your Members to confer with some Members of this House, concerning the best Method of carrying on such a Correspondence.
