

( Monday July 28, 1729. )

**T**HE House met according to Adjournment. The Members were call'd, and all present, except Mr. *Cralb*, as on *Saturday*. The Proceedings of *Saturday* were read over.

Capt. *Blackstone* appears in the House this Day. The Question being put, Whether this House should address the Governour jointly, with the Upper House, concerning the settling a friendly Correspondence with the Gentlemen of *Virginia*, or separately? *Resolv'd*, that the Address be jointly.

*Order'd*, That Mr. *Dulany*, Col. *Gale*, Mr. *Jenings*, and Mr. *Samuel Hanson*, do join such Members as shall be appointed by the Upper House, to prepare the Address.

The following Message being prepared, was order'd to be enter'd thus:

*By the Lower House of Assembly, July 28, 1729.*

*May it please your Honours,*

This House hath resolv'd, as by your Message of the Twenty Fifth of this Instant, sent here by *Benjamin Tasker*, Esq; was propos'd to address the Governour, in Conjunction with you, pursuant to the Report of the Conferees, appointed by both Houses, to settle a friendly Correspondence with our Neighbours, the *Virginians*; and hath appointed Mr. *Dulany*, Col. *Gale*, Mr. *Jenings*, and Mr. *Samuel Hanson*, to join any Members of your House, to prepare the said Address.

Sign'd per Order, *M. Macnemara*, Cl. Lo. Ho.

Sent to the Upper House by Col. *Gale*, Mr. *Jenings*, and Mr. *Hanson*; who return, and say they deliver'd the same.

The Bill, Intituled, *An Act to make and emit Twenty Four Thousand Pounds current Money, &c.* was read the first Time, and order'd to lie on the Table.

*Edmund Jenings*, Esq; from the Committee of Laws, delivers to Mr. Speaker, a Bill, Intituled, *An Act to encourage the Importation of Gold and Silver into this Province.*

The Bill, Intituled, *An Act for the better Administration of Justice in Testamentary Affairs, &c.* coming under Consideration of the House this Day, and the Message sent with it; wherein Amendments were propos'd to the said Bill,

*It was resolv'd*, That none of the Amendments propos'd by the Upper House, in their said Message, to the said Bill, be made; except the Ninth, Thirteenth, and Fourteenth.

*Philip Lee*, Esq; from the Upper House, delivers to Mr Speaker, the Bill, Intituled, *An Act for the Relief of Creditors, and to prevent Frauds and Deceits occasioned by secret Sales, &c.* thus indors'd, *viz.*

*By the Upper House of Assembly, July 26, 1729.*

Read the first Time, and order'd to lie on the Table.

Read a second Time, and will pass.
