or so many of them as shall have been agreed to by both Houses, should pass into A8s; It is Matter of Surprize therefore to this House, that the Bill for the bester Adminigration of Juffice; &co. with fundry Amendments, and Concellions afterwards made therein, as by our Meffige of July 26, and 30, (in all which Amendments, and Concellious, you feem to have concurred with ca) hould be laid affeep, as it were, in your Houle. And another Bill fent up with your Mellinge, by Mr. Beale and Mr. Georges proposing (fir the Sake of Dispatch ) the same Amendments to be made to former Acts of Affembly; which have not in any Manner been negotisted in either of the Two Houles, during this Seifien; Which Proceeding of Yours, in our Opinion, is very Unparliamentary; and therefore, upon the Question put, We have resolved, That the Additional and Supplementary Act, to the loveral Acts for the Administration of Justice in Testamentary defairs, be not received by this House; and have therefore herewith returned it to you, lest the pressing on a Conclusion to this present Session, by such Unpresidented Practice, might hereafter be of mischievous Consequences in Legislation : And seeing that your House, for any Thing that appears in the faid Meilige, have concurred with us in all the Amendments, and Alterations, made to the fuid Bill, We therefore infift, that the Bill for the better Admin fration of Justice, with the Amendments, as they now stand, if you have intirely agreed with us thereon, may pale your House.
