we can, by avoiding Disputes about any particular Words or Phrases, provided we have the Benefit of the Laws of our Mother Country secured to us; without which, your Committee conceive, we cannot be secure in any Thing, your Committee propose the following Alteration; that instead of these Words, viz. according to the Laws, Statutes, and restonable Customs of England, agreeable to the Ujage and Constitution of this Province; the following Words to be inferred, vizaccording to the reasonable Customs of England, and the Laws and Statutes thereof, as are, or shall herea after be enasted, agreeable to the Ujage or Constitution of this Province. And Submit the same to the Confideration of this House.

Sign'd per Order, William Ghifelin, Cl. Com. The House unanimously concurred with the said Report, and ordered the Committee of Laws to prepare a Bill, to altertain the Form of Outh of Judge or Justice, conformable thereto.

Ordered, That the Committee of Laws prepare a Bill, to confirm the Payments made under the

late Tohacco-Lizv.

The House adjourns until Two of the Clock in the Afternoon.

The House met according to Adjournment. The Members were called, and all present, as in Morning, except Mr. Matthews.

Which Bill was read the first and second Time, by an especial Order, and passed; and sent to the Upper House, by Col. Greenfield, and Twenty Three more. They return, and acquaint Mr. Speaker, with the Delivery of their Melfage.

Col. Gale was added to the Committee of Liws.

Order'd, That Daniel Dulany, Esq; prepare a Supplementary Bill, to the Act, for the Advancement of Fustice.

The Question was put, That an Alteration be made to the Law concerning the Supersedeas of Executions? Refolv'd in the Negative.

The Question was put, That an Alteration be made in the present Condition of Sheriffs Bonds gi-

ven for the Execution of their Offices? Refolv'd in the Affirmative.

Order'd, That the Committee of Laws prepare a Bill accordingly. Col. Gale, from the Committee, appointed to inspect the Allegations in William Vernon, and Keysar Knighton, their Petition; brought in their Report, read it in his Place, and delivered it at the Board.

The Report was as followeth: 4 Your Committee having taken into Confideration the Petition of William Vernon; and think reasonable the same may be granted; but in Regard, the Land proposed to be given in Lieu of the Land mentioned in the Petition, is uncultivated; and that possibly, Disputes may bereafter arise, in Relation to the same, they propose, that a Clause may be in the Bill, making void the fame, in Case Keysar Knighton, or his Heirs, shall ever by Law be disoffess'd of the Land proposed to be convey'd to him, for Want of sufficient Title in the said Vernon. Which is submirred to the Consideration of the House.
