And whereas the People called Quakers, make a Scruple of Conscience of paying the Forty per Poll, settled for supporting the Clergy of this Province, which therefore hath been always levied on them by Way of Execution. Be it therefore Enacted, by the Authority aforesaid, That the leveral Sheriffs of the Counties, where any Quakers relide, shall, and may, by Virtue of this A&, and their Office, at any convenient Time, before the Fifreenth Day of March, Yearly, levy (by Way of Execution) on such Quakers, the Grain appointed by this Act, to be paid in Lieu of one fourth Part of the Forty per Poll; and so much besides, as shall bear and defray the Charge and Expence of carrying fuch Grain to fuch Place or Places, as Grain payable by other People, is directed by this Act, to be carried to.
